# Our Structure



### Local 4-H Clubs

4-H Clubs, made up of members and volunteer leaders, are responsible for conducting meetings, as well as organizing and carrying out local activities including social, fundraising, and community events. Clubs form the Quebec 4-H Association. Members and leaders have the opportunity to participate in local, provincial, national, and international 4-H programs.

### 4-H Quebec Association

The provincial organization keeps track of individual memberships and club registrations, while administering all provincial 4-H programs and opportunities. 4-H Quebec also works collaboratively with other provincial 4-H agencies to provide resources and opportunities to members along with the Canadian 4-H Council and its committees. 4-H Quebec is run by a Board of Directors made up of member representatives, and four standing committees: Advisory, Executive, Financial, and Programs and Regulations. Individuals are nominated to the committees at the Annual General Meeting.

### Canadian 4-H Council

The objective of the Canadian 4-H Council is to provide relevant programs and services which are consistent with the 4-H philosophy and serve to enhance provincial 4-H programs. The Council organizes and coordinates national and international conferences, exchanges, and scholarships. The Council is a not-for-profit, non-governmental agency governed by a group of member representatives. With the assistance of the Canadian 4-H Foundation, the Council provides funding assistance to the provincial associations. The mission of the Canadian 4-H Council is "Providing strong national leadership to ensure a quality 4-H program across Canada."

## **Board of Directors**

Board members are elected for one-year terms. There is presently no limit on the number of years a board member may serve though the position of President is a maximum two year term. The Board is made up of 4-H members, youth from various clubs contributing their time for the benefit of the 4-H program and its members. In addition to attending the Annual General Meeting, board members meet three or more times a year in Ste-Anne-de-Bellevue or via conference call.

### **Executive Committee**

The Executive Committee is made up of the President, Vice -President, Past-President, Chair of Programs and Regulations, Chair of Financial Committee. tor. It reports to the Board of Directors.

### **Financial Committee**

The Financial Committee is made up of a minimum of 3 and maximum of 10 people in addition to the President and Vice-President. The role of the committee is to oversee the administration of the organization's finances. This includes but is not limited to employee salaries, expense account claims and budgets. All recommendations from the financial committee must be submitted to the board for approval

### **Programs and Regulations Committee**

The Programs and Regulations Committee is responsible for all Provincial regulations, including: Constitution review, Policies and Procedures, Rally Rules, Activity rules and guidelines. It is also responsible for producing the criteria for different selection processes within the organization and selecting delegates for national programs. The committee is responsible for preparing proposals for changes to existing or new programs. Decisions of the committee shall be reported to the board and require ratification. The Programs and Regulations Committee shall be comprised of 5 - 15 members, 2 of which must be Provincial Directors.

### **Advisory Committee**

The Advisory Committee is made up of at least 5 people, of whom 2 must be executive committee members. The remainder are adult advisors and partner representatives. The role of the Advisory Committee shall be to offer advice to the provincial board on matters of debate. Any questions concerning the policies and by laws of the organization are reviewed by the committee and their response gets submitted to the board.

### **YAC Delegate**

The Youth Advisory Committee is the national youth voice for 4-H Canada, providing leadership opportunities for outstanding young people from across the country who have been part of 4-H and want to continue to play a role and contribute. YAC is made up of 12 provincial members who meet as a committee on a regular basis, play a large ambassador role within their provinces, make recommendations to 4-H Canada regarding programming, policy development, marketing and communications. The 4-H Quebec YAC member also sits on the Board of Directors.

### **Provincial Coordinator**

Is responsible for financial and risk management including budgets, grant applications, and screening processes, as well as managing human resources and overseeing coordination of provincial activities. This position sits on the 4-H Canada Provincial Supervisory Committee, and Fund Development Network in addition to the QCGN Executive Directors' Network.

### **Event Coordinator - Summer Position**

Is responsible for the organization of large scale events and special projects, delivery of resources, and promotion of opportunities.

### **Office Manager - Summer Position**

Is responsible for assisting on all aspects of communications and publications.

### **QCGN**

The Quebec Community Groups Network is a not-for-profit organization linking 41 English-language community organizations across Quebec and advocating for the official language minority in the province.

## 4-H Quebec Mission

4-H Quebec is a community based organization, which is dedicated to developing life skills such as leadership, cooperation, responsibility and independence for the English-speaking rural youth of Quebec through achievement and skill development

At 4-H Quebec, we focus on helping our members building self-confidence and acquiring skills in a fun and safe environment. Aimed at promoting the personal growth of English speaking youth aged 6 to 25, we provide opportunities for learning and skill development in an ever-evolving world. By harnessing the talents and enthusiasm of our members, volunteers, and staff, we work together to offer new programming, while continuing to uphold our successful traditional activities. Members can engage in diverse projects, from livestock and square dancing to communication.

While deeply rooted in a rich agricultural history, we acknowledge that everyone can benefit from 4-H's holistic and socially conscious learning approach. The Kahnawake 4-H Club, established in July 2024, is the first Indigenous 4-H club in Quebec. Our focus is on reconnecting youth with traditional skills in hunting, fishing, trapping, and agriculture from an Indigenous perspective. Although we are newly formed, we've already hosted several activities to engage both youth and parents, including wild game skinning and cleaning, waterfowl preparation and cooking, wild blueberry picking, and family cooking classes. Looking ahead, we're excited to expand our activities to include more agricultural tours, a gardening club, and additional hunting and trapping workshops.

## 2024 Club Activities

- Wild Game Cleaning & Skinning Workshop
- Waterfowl Plucking, Cleaning, and Cooking Class
- Wild Blueberry Picking Trip
- Family Cooking Class (with a focus on traditional recipes)
- Fishing Workshop with our local environmental protection office– Including fish testing and identification
- Medicine Picking Trip – Learning about traditional plants and their uses
- Trapping Workshop – Introduction to ethical trapping techniques
- Deer Workshop – Hands-on experience in cleaning, skinning, and meat preparation

These activities have been designed to encourage youth and families to participate, learn traditional practices, and help promote food sovereignty.

## Future Plans for Our Club

- Accessible Garden Beds Project – Install accessible garden beds at local community sites
- Garden Seedling Giveaway/Fundraiser
- Members will help create a large greenhouse and start seedlings
- Once ready, seedlings will be donated to elder homes, schools, and daycares
- Expanded Hunting, Bow Archery, and Trapping Workshops – Traditional skills training
- Traditional Medicine-Making Workshop – Learn about and prepare natural remedies
- Family Cooking Classes – Focus on preparing meals using traditional ingredients and methods
